 - Technical Assistance and Outreach through our website, publications and outreach




Coastal Management Assistance Grants

- More than \$8.0 million for over 150 projects has been award since 1997
- Grants awarded on merit basis
- Applicants provide at least 50% of overall project costs (1:1 ration)
- \$300,000 \$500,000 awarded per cycle
- Project awards range from \$50,000 to \$150,000
- Reimbursement grant

- Pre-proposal application available now on our website
- Pre-proposal application due mid-October
- ✤ Late or incomplete proposals not accepted
- Applicants encouraged/discouraged to submit full application by early November
- Full applications due mid-December
- Grant awards announced end of June
- Projects begin July 1 and completed within 12-18 months







ELIGIBLE LOCATIONS







Coastal Grants Map Viewer







Projects Not Funded

All Applicants Must Register with SAM.gov

- Registration is required by the Federal Funding Accountability & Transparency Act of 2006
- Applicants must have an "ACTIVE" registration with SAM.gov to qualify for funding and attach proof of active registration to their pre-proposal application

- Incomplete or late applications will not be accepted

 - Provides the opportunity for local government and organizations to review/comment on proposed federally funded projects/programs that could potentially impact their community



Full Application Review Process

- Multi-tiered review process
- External Review Team rates projects and submits recommendations to ODNR/OCM
- ✤ Projects rated on:
 - ✤ Impact on Coastal Resources (50%)
 - Well thought out Methods, Budget, and Timeline (50%)
- ODNR will review project recommendations, select the projects, and submit them to NOAA for final approval

Not "Fundable" Proposals

- ✤ Incomplete
- Not submitted on time
- Project details scattered/unclear
- Discrepancies
- Ineligible cost/budget issues
- Unrealistic goals and timeframes
- Results not measurable/sustainable
- No community partnerships/collaborations

NatureWorks projects focus on acquisition, development, or rehabilitation of public park and recreation areas.

Funding Overview

- Funded through Ohio Parks & Natural Resources Bond Issue November 1993
- Provides up to 75% reimbursement assistance for local government subdivisions – requires 25% match Funds allocated to each Ohio county (per-capita basis)
- ✓ Applications typically due June 1st each year
- ✓ Project Duration 1 ½ to 2 years

Eligible Projects & Sponsors

- Parks & Recreation Areas
 - Acquisition of parkland
 - Park development of all kinds trails, playgrounds, shelters, skateparks, ballfields/courts, restrooms, boating access, etc.
 - Rehabilitation

ODNR's Recreational Trails Grant Program

Funding Overview

- ✓ Authorized by US Congress Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act 1991
- ✓ Administered by ODNR in cooperation with Federal Highway Administration
- ✓ Provides up to 80% reimbursement assistance; 20% match required
- ✓ Awards capped at \$150,000
- ✓ Applications due February 1st of each year
- ✓ 15 months project duration
- ✓ 15 years minimum open to the public

- Land acquisition for a trail
- Trailhead facilities
- Education Safety & Environmental protection (5% limit)



Funding Overview

- ✓ Funding is available for both Western and Central Lake Erie Basin projects
- ✓ Matching dollars not required, but encouraged
- Applications submitted on a rolling basis

Eligible Projects

- Project focus on nutrient reduction and water quality improvement
- ✓ Hydrologic restoration/creation of wetland on hydric soils
- ✓ Hydrologic enhancement of existing wetlands and floodplains
- ✓ Storm flow storage, erosion reduction
- ✓ Project can be completed within two years of signed agreement

Funding Overview

- ✓ Section 319 awards nearly \$3 million annually
- Projects that reduce impairment of water resources, threats to high quality water resources & other NPS-focused projects are eligible for funding
- Practices listed in Ohio's Nonpoint Source Management Plan are Eligible: <u>www.epa.ohio.gov/Portals/35/nps/2019-</u> NPS Mgmt Plan.pdf
- Requires an approved 9-Element Nonpoint Source Implementation Strategy (NPS-IS) that contains Project Summaries of practices being applied for funding

Lake Erie Commission Grants Program

Lake Erie Protection Fund Grant

- ✓ Funded through the Lake Erie License Plate program
- ✓ Focuses on project that will address the Lake Erie Protection & Restoration Plan priorities funding
- ✓ Funding availability is determined each year, and if available, posted in the Spring
- ✓ Grants up to \$50,000 with a 1-year project timeline
- Matching dollars are not required by encouraged



Lake Erie Communities and Coastal Resilience Grant

Funding Overview

- ✓ Eligible entities in 8 Lake Erie Coastal Counties
- Projects focusing on Coastal Resilience with a priority in Underserved Communities
- ✓ \$50,000 to \$250,000 for eligible projects
- ✓ 1 year project timeframe
- ✓ Applications due October 3, 2022
- ✓ Awarded project announced sometime in December 2022



Great Lakes Sediment & Nutrient Reduction Program

- ✓ Federal-state partnership to improve Great Lakes water quality
- Focus on reducing phosphorus from agricultural non-point sources, streambank/shoreline erosion and stormwater runoff
- Provides grants to applicants from local conservation districts, watershed organizations and local units of government within the Great Lakes Basin
- ✓ RFP typically release in February of each year
- ✓ Program began in 1991 and is funded by USDA-NRCS through GLRI since 2010.

COASTAL MANAGEMENT ASSISTANCE GRANTS

The Coastal Management Assistance Grant program is a competitive annual grant opportunity offered by the Ohio Department of Natural Resources through the Ohio Coastal Management Program. Grants can be issued to eligible entities for water quality improvement, coastal planning, education programs, land acquisition, research, public access, habitat restoration, and other purposes.

Funding is provided through the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) in the U.S. Department of Commerce. Approximately \$400,000 total is available for projects annually. Applications should request \$50,000 to \$150,000 in federal funds. A minimum 1:1 non-federal match is required, and other federal funds cannot be used for match. Funds are provided on a reimbursement basis.

Eligible Applicants

Eligible recipients include units of local government (municipalities, townships, counties, school districts, park districts, port authorities, etc.), state agencies, academic institutions, and 501(c)(3) non-profit corporations. Only public entities are eligible to receive grants for construction, engineering/design, or land acquisition projects.

Timeframes

- Pre-proposals are required and typically due in September/October. Specific dates are available by mid-August each year.
- Applicants who submitted pre-proposals are notified in November whether the submittal of a full application is recommended. Full applications are typically due in December.
- Funding is for projects that begin no earlier than July 1 of the following year.

Eligible Uses of Funds

- Feasibility studies and engineering reports for enhancing coastal resources
- Protection/enhancement of wetlands, dunes, and other coastal habitat
- Habitat enhancement using dredge material
- Increased public access to Lake Erie and its tributaries
- Protection of historical and cultural coastal resources
- Redevelopment of deteriorating or underutilized waterfronts and ports
- Other purposes approved by the Director of the Ohio Department of Natural Resources

Ineligible Uses of Funds

- Restroom facilities
- Erosion control structures
- Beach nourishment
- Maintenance activities
- Active recreation facilities, such as ball fields, etc.
- Parking lots or roads
- Water or sewer lines
- Activities required as a permit condition or mitigation
- Construction on private property
- Construction or acquisition outside the designated Coastal Area
- Other uses that are deemed ineligible
